## Julia Bowen French Metcalf (Mrs. George Reuben Metcalf)

1854-1922

Julia Bowen French Metcalf, born in Mexico, NY on January 31, 1854, was the 6th great granddaughter of Roger Williams of Rhode Island. She was admitted to the Rhode Island chapter of the Colonial Dames in 1895, three years after the chapter was founded, and is listed in the first record book of the Colonial Dames in the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantation. The following year, she was one of a group of 14 women who started the Minnesota chapter - the fourth non-colonial state to be incorporated. The first meeting was held on March 24, 1896.

Julia married George Reuben Metcalf, who graduated from Columbia University medical school in 1874, in Syracuse NY and their son George Putnam Metcalf was born in 1876. Julia's husband

was a noted physician and freemason. After they arrived in Minnesota, his office, and their residence, was at 110 West 4th Street in St. Paul, where the St. Paul Public Library and James J. Hill Library were later built.

On March 1, 1905, the *Minneapolis Star* reported that Dr. Metcalf had died suddenly of a seizure in Italy. The couple had left for a two year tour of Europe the previous summer. Julia returned to St. Paul and lived in the Hotel Aberdeen until she passed away in 1922.

Julia was involved in the Harvest Festival, Mitford House, Women's Auxiliary to the World's Fair Committee of MN, Women's Civic League, and New Century Club. She was on the first board of directors of the Women's City Club of



The Hotel Aberdeen, built in 1889, was one of St. Paul's finest luxury apartment/hotels in the late nineteenth century. Larry Millet described it in Lost Twin Cities, 1992. Julia lived there for sixteen years at the height of its popularity.

St. Paul. The 1921 *Minnesota History* magazine thanked her for the donation of about 500 books to MNHS, "finely bound and in the best editions." She was also chairwoman of the committee of women who made arrangements for the dinner on the occasion of the dedication exercises of the new Minnesota Historical Society building in 1920.
